Book Recommendations:

Your editor read a wonderful book about growing up in the 1950s. **The Life & Times of the Thunderbolt Kid: A Memoir** (2006) by Bill Bryson. It's the story from the point of view of a young boy, whose parents both work. It is set in Des Moines, Iowa but it could easily be Seattle, Tacoma or Portland.

FOML pioneer Nobu Kawasaki is recommending **Spearhead: An American Tank Gunner, His Enemy, and a Collision of Lives in World War II** (2019) by Adam Makos. A riveting World War II story of an American tank gunner's journey into the heart of the Third Reich, where he will meet destiny in an iconic armor duel—and forge an enduring bond with his enemy.

Carol Campbell recommends the "Miss Read" **Fairacre** series of novels. These novels describe life in a small English village from the point of view of the schoolmistress. They were first published in the 1950s and 60s, and portray the details of English country life with joy, dismay, and no little amusement. You will not forget Mrs. Pringle, the school cleaner. I have found them charming and an easy distraction from the stresses of difficult times. Look for them in the KRL catalog with an author search: "Read, Miss".

KRL's Sarah Jaffa suggests **The Color of Air** by Gail Tsukiyama. In 1935, as the volcano Mauna Loa erupts on the Big Island of Hawai'i and threatens to destroy nearby towns, a community welcomes back a prodigal son from the mainland and reckons with the damage of long-kept secrets.
